Initially, Urmila consulted many neighbouring hospitals with the hope of correcting the vision in her left eye. However with every visit, all she found was another closed door.

She visited the VFI-conducted eye camp in Alamanda village, Andhra Pradesh in October 2015 with her husband, where they were given detailed information on her current vision related situation. They were informed that a surgery can



help correct her vision to a great extent and were advised to go for the same at the earliest. With the help of expert VFI doctors and staff team, a plan was made to operate on Urmila the next week. She was admitted for 3-4 days post her surgery for observations and was discharged with much clearer vision and a happy smile on her face.

Seeing people like Urmila go out of the hospital with a smile and a confident stride is what counts for us the most at VFI.


# A Successful Fundraiser! An Enchanting Evening!
